

The Writing Center at Muhlenberg College

Tutorial Sessions can help you to:

Understand reading and writing assignments

Discover interesting ideas and topics for writing assignments

Develop a rough draft, revise a draft, or edit the final version of a written assignment

Arrive at a thesis and support that thesis with evidence

Organize an essay, research paper, lab report, or other writing assignment

Use and cite secondary sources

Understand and learn how to correct grammar and punctuation errors

Programs offered by The Writing Center:

<u>Writing Center Tutors:</u> We provide drop-in tutorial sessions that usually last 30 minutes. All Muhlenberg students and employees are eligible for this service. These sessions are on a first-come, first-serve basis at the Writing Center, located on Level A of the Trexler Library in the Writing and Information Consultation Center. Students may also make an appointment by visiting our website. Our tutors will not write your paper for you but will address your ideas and organization as thoroughly as possible in the time available.

<u>Writing Assistants:</u> WAs are assigned to First-Year Seminars and work closely with the professor. Together, the WA and professor help you make the transition from high school to college writing. WAs attend class, lead workshop sessions on writing, and meet with you individually and in small groups throughout the semester.

Writing Mentors: Mentors provide weekly tutorial sessions for students that may benefit from more consistent, in-depth support. Mentors usually meet with students for one hour a week at a time and location that is convenient for the student and mentor. Students interested in working with a Writing Mentor must be recommended by a professor or the Academic Resource Center to Kate O'Donoghue, Assistant Director of the Writing Center, for an interview.

<u>Writing Associates:</u> Writing Associates are writing tutors who are assigned to work with an upper-level class, working directly with the professor and tutoring the students individually. These tutors do not necessarily attend all classes but work closely with the professor in developing writing workshops. Associates, possessing understanding of the material specific to the class, function as a resource both for the professor and the students throughout the semester.

Music At Muhlenberg VOCAL STUDY

What opportunities will I have to perform?

Ensembles: Students of all music abilities are invited to participate in one or more of the many ensembles available through the Music Department. We offer several different opportunities for solo and ensemble vocal performance. Ensembles are non-credit courses, but appear on the student's transcript as a record of participation and receive a "Satisfactory" or "Unsatisfactory" grade.

College Choir

Directed by Dr. Christopher Jackson The College Choir is large, mixed, un-auditioned ensemble whose repertoire includes all musical eras, ranging from a cappella Renaissance selections, madrigals, and part-songs to classical, romantic and contemporary masterworks with instrumental accompaniment (organ/piano, chamber ensembles, or full orchestra). The College Choir present concerts each semester and participate in the Muhlenberg Candlelight Carols services in December. Two rehearsals per week.

Chamber Singers

Directed by Dr. Christopher Jackson The Chamber Singers are a select, auditioned, and smaller group of advanced choristers specializing in more challenging repertoire and dedicated to special concerts and projects. The Chamber Singers present concerts each semester, participate in the Muhlenberg Candlelight Carols services in December, and perform for numerous special events on and off campus. Membership in Chamber Singers requires co-enrollment in College Choir and offers solo opportunities and the chance to work with visiting guest artists from the professional choral world. Two rehearsals per week.

Opera Workshop

Music Department Faculty Director (Spring semesters only) The Opera Group gives advanced vocal students the opportunity to perform operatic scenes or entire works in semi-staged or fully staged productions. Two rehearsals per week.

Collegium musicum

Directed by Dr. Ted Conner The *Collegium musicum* is a select group of male and female vocalists who perform late Renaissance and early Baroque music one voice per part accompanied by an ensemble of period instruments. One rehearsal per week.

Student Recitals presenting students enrolled in Applied Music lessons occur regularly throughout the semester and are held in our beautiful Recital Hall.

Who will be my teacher?

PATRICIA KOCH BUDLONG Soprano

Patricia Budlong holds a Performance Certificate in Opera and a Master of Music in Vocal Performance from DePaul University in Chicago, as well as a Bachelor of Science in Music Education from West Chester University. In 1994 Patricia won a position in the Lyric Opera of Chicago chorus. During her five seasons at the Lyric, Patricia had the opportunity to work with world renowned singers, conductors, stage directors and coaches. During this same period she made her professional operatic debut at the Pine Mountain Music Festival in Michigan as the title character in Carlisle Floyd's dramatic opera, Susannah. Other operatic roles with which she is identified include Micaëla (Carmen) by Bizet, Musetta (La Bohème) by Puccini, Alice (Falstaff) by Verdi, the title role in Massenet's Manon, Violetta (La Traviata) by Verdi, and Elle (La Voix Humaine) by Poulenc. Her concert repertoire includes such works as the soprano solo in Mahler's Symphony No. 4, Strauss's Vier Letze Lieder, Barber's Knoxville: Summer of 1914; soprano soloist in Hadyn's Die Schöpfung and Mendelssohn's Elijah. She is also an active chamber musician performing with Take 3 Woodwind Trio and the Alberta Percussion Ensemble in Edmonton Canada as well as Two-Part Invention and Satori in the Lehigh Valley. In addition to teaching at Muhlenberg, Patricia teaches at Moravian College where she also directs the Opera Workshop and has been awarded the T. Edgar Shields Prize for excellence in studio teaching. In addition to her performing career, Patricia has maintained an active teaching career. Her pedagogical focus is on engaging her students in using their entire instrument in healthful singing, while developing excellent musicianship and a diverse repertoire.

BRIAN CHU Baritone

Brian Chu holds an M.M.in Voice/Opera from the Peabody Conservatory of Music and a B.F.A. in Architecture from Cornell University. He has performed numerous roles with opera companies of Philadelphia, Washington, and Baltimore, and specializes in repertoire by Mozart, Rossini and Puccini. Brian Chu has been a Resident Artist with the Baltimore Opera Studio, the Caramoor Music Festival, and the Carmel Bach Festival. Recital performances have been at Carnegie's Weill Hall, Merkin Hall, and Washington's Phillips Collection, and concert engagements on five continents. He is an established oratorio and early music soloist with The King's Noyse, Cathedral Choral Society, Concept Artists of Baltimore, the Dryden Ensemble, Hesperus, Piffaro, Philadelphia Singers, Brandywine Baroque, and many others. Brian Chu teaches on the voice faculties of Muhlenberg College, Swarthmore College, and Rowan University, and is director of the Swarthmore Art Song Salon Project.

MEGAN DURHAM Mezzo-Soprano

Mezzo soprano Megan Durham, MM, Cert. SVS, RYT-200, serves on the voice faculties of Muhlenberg College, Moravian College and DeSales University. She also works as a Singing Voice Specialist (SVS) in partnership with medical professionals as part of a voice care team to habilitate singers diagnosed with voice disorders. As a certified yoga teacher and YogaVoice® Practitioner, Megan is passionate about how mindfulness based practices allow singers to re-pattern the body's response to fear and trauma. By mitigating unnecessary muscle tension and calming the mind, singers can reveal what is innately beautiful and authentic in the voice by asking not "is it correct?" but rather, is it "free?" In demand as a master clinician, Megan is a frequent workshop presenter for regional and state chapters of the National Association of Teachers of Singing, the American Choral Director's Association, as well as college and high school music programs across the United States. Megan holds a Master of Music degree in voice pedagogy and performance from Westminster Choir College of Rider University, and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in music from the University of Richmond. She completed her certification in singing voice habilitation with Dr. Karen Wicklund at the Chicago Center for Professional Voice. Megan serves as the President of the Lehigh Valley chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and is a member of the New York Singing Teacher's Association, the Voice Foundation, VASTA and Yoga Alliance.

ELLIE ESCHER Soprand

Ellie Escher is a performer/pedagogue who is as passionate about teaching as she is about singing. Ms. Escher holds a Bachelor of Arts in Music (Magna Cum Laude) from Scripps College in Claremont, CA and a Master of Music in Vocal Performance and Pedagogy (with distinction) from Westminster Choir College. While at WCC she studied voice science with Dr. Scott McCoy (*Your Voice: An Inside View*) and Vocal Pedagogy with Marvin Keenze. She has participated in a wide variety of professional development workshops and seminars ranging from YogaVoice® with Mark Moliterno to Vocal Health with Dr. Anat Keidar. Ms. Escher has performed regionally as a recitalist, as a principle artist in Opera and Operetta, and as a soloist with the Harmonium Choral Society of Morristown, N.J. She has pursued her passion for early music with the Amherst Early Music festival, studying with early music expert Julianne Baird. A highlight of her journey as a voice teacher came in 2008, when Ms. Escher was one of twelve young teachers selected to participate in the National Association of

Teachers of Singing (NATS) Summer Intern program. As an emerging voice teacher mentored by renowned Master Teachers, she was praised for her pedagogical knowledge and comprehensive instructional skill.

Ms. Escher is also a 200-hour Registered Yoga Teacher, a distinction that has given her voice teaching increased depth. In July 2013 she completed YogaVoice® Practitioner certification and is now one of a handful of singers/teachers who hold this credential. YogaVoice® aims to uncover a singer's most authentic expression through a synthesis of *Bel Canto* principals of vocal development and Classical Yoga practices, a natural fit for Ms. Escher's teaching philosophy.

MAJA LISA FRITZHUSPEN Mezzo-Soprano

Maja Lisa FritzHuspen has taught voice at the Muhlenberg College, University of Iowa, Mainstage Center for the Arts, StageCoach Theatre arts school, Conservatory of Music and Dance, and in her private voice studio in Philadelphia. She holds a MA and MFA in vocal performance from the University of Iowa and a BM from Augsburg College. She also certified in YogaVoice®. She is a member of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and the Music Teachers National Association. She has been the musical director for High School Musical, Willy Wonka and Hairspray. Maja Lisa has had students perform in Matilda on Broadway, the Walnut Street Theatre, and attend prestigious music colleges. As a Mezzo-Soprano, she has sung numerous operatic roles and has been featured as a soloist with orchestras, in concerts and Oratorios. Performance venues include, ConcertOpera Philadelphia, Opera Lancaster, Delaware Valley Opera Company, Manhattan Opera, Center City Opera Theatre, and Independence Symphonia. She has performed over 25 roles including Hansel (Hansel and Gretel), Orlofsky (*Die Federmaus*), Suzuki (*Madame Butterfly*), Meg (*Falstaff*), Bersi (*Andrea Chénier*), Dinah (*Trouble in Tahiti*), and 2nd lady (*Magic Flute*). Her soloist credits include, Handel's *Messiah*, Vivaldi's *Gloria*, Beethoven's 9th Symphony and Pergolesi's *Stabat Mater*. She is a teaching artist with the Learning Arts, performing and teaching in NY.

CHRISTOPHER JACKSON Bass

Dr. Christopher Jackson is the Director of Choral Activities and Head of Voice at Muhlenberg College since 2017. Professor Jackson works frequently as a guest conductor for Honor Choir Festivals on the east coast, and has led master classes and workshops on conducting and Baroque music at the San Juan Conservatory of Music. He has taught courses in Music History, Vocal Methods and Pedagogy, and Conducting. He is also the co-founder of professional ensemble *Bricolage*, which debuted with performances of David Lang's Pulitzer Prize winning composition, *The Little Match Girl Passion*, in conjunction with various Collegiate and High School Art Departments and to raise funds for Women's and Children's shelters. In his previous position at Lycoming College he led national and international tours (China, Canada, Florida) and co-founded the Lycoming Baroque Choir and Orchestra. That ensemble was honored to have been selected as a guest performer for the PaACDA 2016 Fall Conference.

In addition to teaching, conducting, and academic research, Christopher is also active as a professional choral singer, and soloist. Most recently, he was honored to sing as a member of the Grammy Award-Winning ensemble, *Roomful of Teeth*. He is a core member of and Educational Outreach Manager for the professional chamber choir, *Skylark Vocal Ensemble*. He is featured on *Skylark's* recent album, *Crossing Over*, released in the spring of 2016, and has sung with other professional ensembles such as the *Tucson Chamber Artists*, *Kinnara Ensemble*, *Santa Fe Desert Chorale*, *The South Dakota Chorale*, and more. His areas of research include the choral music of Benjamin Britten, links between modern educational practices, learning theory, and music education, and programming Renaissance and Baroque Music for choirs of all ages and abilities.

Dr. Jackson received his BA in voice performance from Oklahoma State University, and his MM in choral conducting from Westminster Choir College, and was the graduate assistant conductor of the Westminster Symphonic Choir under Dr. Joe Miller. He received his DMA in choral conducting from the University of North Texas.

DONNA JANUSKO Mezzo-Soprano/Alto

As a non-traditional student Donna Janusko had a more extensive time in vocal training and pedagogical issues. Almost ten years older than most undergrads, and in a time when older musicians were rarer as incoming students, she found that the traditional track would in some ways be closed to her, particularly in the NATS Competitions and also in Grants available for Grad Schools. Nevertheless, her vocal coach Dale Moore, former president of NATS, encouraged her to continue graduate studies at Ohio State University. Donna first trained as a vocal pedagogist, and then entered the performance track for two additional years. During these five years she did extensive studies in Alexander Technique, Anatomy and Physiology, and Methodologies, working alongside Doctoral students in peer review of teaching techniques. She also became a member of NATS as a teacher and of The Voice Foundation [an association of singing teachers, speech therapists and laryngologists based in NY, Philadelphia and California], which further developed her diagnostic tools. Her teaching tenure at two colleges in the Mid-West honed her skills in the studio. She continued performing in opera at Ohio State University, chorus work in Cleveland Opera, and professional choral/solo work in the Robert Page/Cleveland Singers, under founding member and president of Chorus America, Robert Page.

JOHN KENNEDY Tenor

John Kennedy holds both a B.A. in Voice Performance and a B.A. in Music Education from the Peabody Conservatory of Music. He has performed in opera and concert with the Opera Company of Philadelphia, Baltimore Opera, Hollybush Festival, Trenton Civic Opera, Berks Grand Opera, Camerata Opera Theatre, Philadelphia Savoy, Ocean City Pops Orchestra, Baltimore Handel Choir, Philadelphia Singers, Pennsylvania Pro Musica, and singing City. He was also Tenor and Group Leader of the Opera Workshop of Young Audiences of Eastern Pennsylvania. LAUREN MADIGAN Mezzo-Soprano

Lauren Madigan earned her B.A. from Muhlenberg College in Theatre Arts and English. She holds a master's degrees in Music from The Julliard School and in Opera Performance from The Curtis Institute of Music. She is the winner of the Edith Newfield Scholarship from the Musicians Club of Women, the Rose M. Grund award of the Union Leave Civic and Arts Foundation, the Anna Sosenko Trust Fund, and a Special Judges' Award District Level from the Metropolitan Opera National Council. As a member of the Ryan Opera Center of the Lyric Opera of Chicago, Lauren Madigan appeared on the stage of the Lyric Opera of Chicago as the Fox in *The Cunning Little Vixen*, Alisa in *Lucia di Lammermoor*, Clorinda in *La Cenerentola*, Kate Pinkerton in *Madama Butterfly*, Ida in *Die Fledermaus* and as Donna Elvira in *Don Giovanni*. Her current jazz group is an exciting hybrid of mainstream jazz and world fusion featuring many original compositions and arrangements. June Thomas has performed with jazz artists such as Jimmy heath, Dave Liebman, George Young, Bill Goodwin, Steve Gilmore, Scott Lee, Phil Markowitz, Howie Collins, Duane Eubanks, John Swana, Bootsie Barnes, and others. She has opened for Joe Henderson, Natalie Cole, and woody Herman's Thundering Herd. June Thomas can be heard providing vocal contributions to jazz legend Bob Dourough's latest CD release, recorded at Red Rock Recording Studios.

What opportunities will I have to perform?

Ensembles: Students of all music abilities are invited to participate in one or more of the many ensembles available through the Music Department. Rehearsal commitments for instrumental ensembles vary, are indicated below. Ensembles are noncredit courses, but appear on the student's transcript as a record of participation and receive a "Satisfactory" or "Unsatisfactorv" grade.

Chamber Orchestra Directed by Daniel Boring

The Chamber orchestra is open to all string players and performs one concert each semester. Depending upon repertoire, the ensemble also includes winds, brass, and percussion. Two rehearsals per week.

Collegium musicum Directed by Dr. Ted Conner

The Collegium musicum is a select group of male and female vocalists who perform late Renaissance and early Baroque music one voice per part accompanied by an ensemble of period instruments. One rehearsal per week.

Jazz Big Band Directed by Anthony "Tony" Gairo

The Jazz Big Band performs a variety traditional and contemporary big band jazz repertoire. Two rehearsals per week.

Jazz Improvisation Groups

Led by Dr. Ted Conner, or Tom Kozic and Gary Rissmiller Two groups available in which to participate, each of which explores traditional, progressive, and experimental forms of jazz improvisation. Both groups perform a concert each semester.

Musica da Camera Coached by Vincent Trovato, piano

This chamber music group, which includes vocalists and both wind and string players, performs one concert per semester. One rehearsal per week.

Percussion Ensemble/Drum Circle

Directed by James Thoma

The Percussion Ensemble performs at student recitals and in conjunction with other ensemble concerts in the fall and spring. One rehearsal per week.

Directed by Dr. Andrew Ardizzoia Wind Ensemble

The Wind Ensemble presents an eclectic concert each semester of traditional and contemporary music for winds, brass, and percussion. Two rehearsals per week.

Small Ensembles Music Department Faculty Director

Various types of small music groups including flute ensemble, and other configurations based on interest and availability. Rehearsals according to membership.

Student Recitals presenting students enrolled in Applied Music lessons occur regularly throughout the semester and are held in our beautiful Recital Hall.
