

Gaining Experience in a Competitive Job Market


Internships and career-related experiences are the number one way employers identify new talent. In a competitive job market, how do students position themselves to showcase campus and career talents? Creativity is key!

One of the best ways for students to gain relevant experience is in the classroom. By looking at individual courses, class projects and research topics, resume placement is an opportunity to demonstrate the connection between classroom and career. These classroom topics can generate resume keywords that are industry/career-focused and will help a resume rise to the top. They can be directly relatable to the internship/job description, thus being pulled by an Applicant Tracking System (ATS) used by many employers as they comb through literally hundreds of resumes in an online application. This is particularly important for first-year and sophomore students who may not have had the opportunity to find meaningful internship experience.

Internships (both paid and unpaid) are the best way for students and employers to test the waters. For students, the opportunity to work in an organization will help them gain first-hand experience in a field of interest. This also gives them a taste of what a particular career has to offer. When a student is in a field that showcases their talents and skills, it provides a springboard for future opportunities. For students who decide the experience does not match their expectations, internships can provide an important learning opportunity about what they would not want to do.

From the employer perspective, the intern pool provides them the opportunity to work with a potential full-time employee. Summer interns offer the employer meaningful and valuable time and talent and a learning opportunity for the student. As with students, employers are looking for a “fit” within their organization. Even if they are not hiring full time, they can provide a valuable professional reference for future opportunities.

The Career Center has an online searchable database for internship and job postings. All students, whether on campus or abroad, have access to the 'Berg Career Vault, which allows for 24/7 student access. We encourage your son/daughter to explore posted opportunities and to utilize the many search engines and databases available through the Career Center. We welcome individual appointments to discuss searching strategies and to foster student success. Additionally, the Career Center offers two workshops during each Friday Common Hour on a variety of career topics. We ask you to encourage your students to take advantage of these resources.

HOUSING INFORMATION FOR SPRING 2016


End of the Academic Year Closing (May):

College housing for seniors closes Sunday, May 22 at 6:00 p.m. We recognize that some students may require housing after the closing time. These students may file a request at:

PHAM holds multiple events throughout the year to increase awareness of relationship violence, STI testing, consent and ending sexual assault on college campuses. Our Health Fair Intern, Danielle Hutcher, in collaboration with Health Services, is busy planning the annual Spring Health Fair April 4, which

includes health-related student research, clubs/organizations, and different health providers from the community.

General health is also promoted through monthly newsletters and social media. In the future, we hope to expand our efforts to mental health awareness and nutritional health.

As part of the preparation process, Danielle Slobodin '16 shares, "My residents have always loved being able to give back to the community. Working with Good Shepherd gives us the perfect opportunity to do that. Making cards and baking for the residents always puts a huge smile on their faces. The residents at Good Shepherd love the homemade cards that help make the event even that much more special to all involved." Additionally, long time residents of Good Shepherd who have been coming to the performances over the years have gotten involved by singing their own songs during the program.
